

## Eco-tourism boost as black rhinos return after 50 years

Eastern black rhinos have been returned to the Loisaba Conservancy in northern Kenya after a 50-year absence, making the region a must-see for eco-tourists and marking its "Big Five" status.

The translocation of 21 of the critically endangered creatures took place in January, in response to concerns over lack of space to reproduce in the rhinos' previous sanctuaries.

Led by the vets of Kenya Wildlife Service in partnership with Elewana Collection, the large-scale project required transferring the rhinos from Nairobi National Park, Ol Pejeta Conservancy, and Lewa Wildlife Conservancy to their new home in Loisaba. The rhinos were then released into a fenced sanctuary, where they are being monitored 24/7 by rangers to ensure their wellbeing.

"It's incredibly exciting to be part of the reintroduction of these rhinos into a landscape where they've been absent for 50 years," said Tom Silvester, CEO of Loisaba Conservancy. "It means so much to us on Loisaba to see this iconic species come home again and it is a mark of Kenya's conservation success."

Loisaba, a 23,500-hectare wildlife conservancy in Laikipia in the highlands of Kenya, was once famous for its healthy population of black rhinos, but rampant poaching in the area since 1976 had devastated their numbers, driving the rhinos to become locally extinct.

As of 2023, there were only 6,458 of the creatures left in Africa – a drastic drop from the estimated 70,000 that roamed the continent in 1970. Of those that remain, just over 1,000 can be found in Kenya – once home to 20,000 of these iconic animals. It's hoped the return of the 21 black rhinos to Loisaba Conservancy, which can host up to 50, will encourage breeding and help towards the Kenyan government's goal of reaching a population of 2,000 by 2037.

The restoration of the rhinos will also bring economic benefits, such as tourism employment for the remote region and revenue flow to nearby communities. There are just 24 rooms across all three properties in the conservancy, which include Loisaba Lodo Springs, Loisaba Tented Camp and the iconic Loisaba Star Beds.

## First sustainability report for Active Travel Group

ATG also championed the work of Cycling for Softies, a luxury cycling tour operator that has been promoting low-impact travel for 35 years and currently offers one of the lowest-carbon holiday options for exploring Europe.
